Working with such artists as the Indigo

Girls and Mother's Finest, Caroline is now getting ready to go on tour with Derek Trucks as his opening act -- not bad for a girl who got her musical start here on Long Island!

But that is another story, what I found interesting was seen as I was leaving the town -- I saw a sign for an annex of Georgia Music Hall Of Fame. Here you had a museum that showcased not only the national artists that came out of Georgia, but also their regional stars.
